





Why road safety matters

21 work-related crash fatalities

1/3 of traumatic workplace fatalities



1,469 WorkSafeBC crashrelated claims

100,000+ lost workdays



Motor vehicle incidents cost more

	All Claims	MVI Claims	Ratio
Claim costs	\$ 21,633	\$ 46,517	215 %
Duration	59 days	93 days	158 %

Staggering consequences for people involved

Huge financial, operational and other costs




Occupational safety requirements

- Occupational safety requirements focus on workplace
- Workplace: where a worker is engaged in any work
- Vehicle used for work is a workplace
- Includes vehicles used for work, whether owned by company or employee



What could possibly go wrong?





Greatest risk = motor vehicle incident!



Focus on crash risks

Hazard	Probability	Severity	Ranking
Collision with log truck, or other large vehicle	LOW	HIGH	2
Get stuck in mud, break down, flat tire	MEDIUM	LOW	3
Drive off road because of fatigue	MEDIUM	HIGH	1



Road safety risk assessments



Hazard Category	Hazard / Contributing Factor	Probability	Severity	Risk Ranking
driver	collision with logging truck or other large vehicle	Low	High	MEDIUM
vehicle	stuck in mud or get a flat tire	Medium	Low	LOW
driver	drive off road due to fatigue	Medium	High	HIGH



Fit for purpose

Is vehicle designed and built for the purposes it will be used?








Regularly inspected, well-maintained

Vehicle-related hazards are easiest to manage




Inspections and maintenance = inexpensive, reliable risk reduction strategy

Verify driver qualifications

Check driver's licence

- issue / expiry dates?
- right <u>class</u> for vehicle they will drive?



Review driver's abstract



Driver orientations

Orient driver to vehicle and expectations

Show where controls are, how to operate

- Explain equipment
- Demonstrate how to inspect vehicle





Ride-along assessments

Observe driver *skills, attitudes* and *behaviours*

- > safely operate vehicle?
- Imitations to assignments?



> additional training required?

Put journey management to work

Manage *routes, schedules* and *expectations* to minimize exposure to journey-related risks

Have a check-in process

Reliable communications are essential





Provide supervision

Implement measures

Check they are working

Follow-up with spot checks

Opportunities to improve?

Make adjustments and corrections

Supervising Employees Who Drive For Work
















- Check *licences* and *abstracts*
- Conduct thorough driver *orientations*
- Make sure employees have necessary driving *skills, attitudes and behaviours*
- Ensure vehicles are *selected*, *inspected* and *maintained*
- Put *journey management* to work
- Provide necessary *supervision*
