














DriveBC road conditions


Google Maps route planning

Local weather conditions

- Find and use "trouble-free" routes
- Avoid routes with steep hills and other known "trouble spots"
- Give yourself enough time to get there
- Accept there may be unexpected delays



- Turn on your headlights and tail lights
- Reduce your speed to match the conditions
- Follow at a safe distance





Follow the rules:

- Company policies and procedures
- The rules of the road If

you are having trouble:

- Pull well off the road
- Turn on your hazard lights
- Follow emergency response process
- Call for help



Tips for different types of weather













Pay attention to temperature

- 7° Celsius: winter tires work better!
- Critical zone: +5° C to -5° C
- Watch your thermometer
- Be aware of transitions
 - Warming during the day; cooling in afternoon
 - Warming / cooling as elevation changes







Drive smoothly

- There's less traction in winter
- Smooth driving maneuvers help maintain traction
 - Gentle brake applications
 - Go easy on the gas pedal
 - Smooth steering





How to control a skid





Do not:

- Panic
- Steer wildly
- Brake quickly



Do:

- Ease off gas or brake pedal
- Look & steer in the direction you want to go



Watch for black ice



- Thin layer of transparent ice on top of black pavement
- Pavement looks shiny
- Dry-looking pavement with glossy patches
- Rain / recent rain, temperature at or just below zero
- Thawing temperatures in day / freezing at night
- Bridges and overpasses



Watch for pedestrians and cyclists



- Not looking / can't see
- In a hurry, more likely to jay-walk, enter crosswalk late
- Double-check before turning right



Signal your intentions



- Give advance warning
- Know your route beforehand
- Avoid last-minute lane changes and turns




Beware the (slippery) beaten path



- Many vehicles on the same track create narrow strips of glare ice especially at intersections
- To find better traction drive to the left or right




Winter serves terrible slushies



- Combination of snow / ice / water
- Unpredictable behaviour / traction
- Use extra caution
- Slow down, steer clear
- Big rigs can throw a lot of slush



Hydroplaning



What is it?

- Thin layer of water accumulates between tires and road surface
- Quickly reduces traction and control

What to do

- Slow down
- Avoid pools / ruts
- Ease off gas, firm grip on wheel



More tips for wet weather



- Headlights and tail lights ON
- Fog lights OFF
- Beware of oil and water
- Keep your distance



Finding your way through the fog



- Fog lights ON
- High beams OFF
- Reduce speed to match visibility




Finding your way through the fog



Warm up the windshield

Set wipers to 'intermittent'



Watch the fog line

Take-aways 2



- Practice
- Match your speed to the conditions
- Steer, accelerate and decelerate smoothly
- Watch the temperature

- Leave more space
- Be careful of black ice, slush, pools of water, splash from other vehicles
- Turn on your headlights and tail lights
- Use your defroster & wipers
